

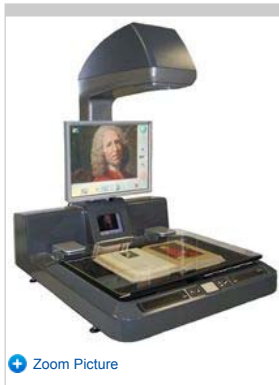


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## Self-service book scanner exhibited in Dominican Republic

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Santo Domingo.— Digitization is a key step not only in sharing knowledge, but also in preserving our heritage. Indexing and archiving digitized documents allow them to be accessed quickly, whether locally or at a distance, while preserving the original documents by minimizing their handling, said Jean-Pierre Gerault.

The president of i2S, who attended the 2nd World Congress Information and Knowledge, presented in Santo Domingo the i2S DigiBook, a scanner for the digitization of ancient books, associated with powerful software suites for automatic image restoration.
